The long-term health of our country depends on Americans—especially young Americans—who understand and appreciate our history and principles. Unfortunately, national tests reveal that young Americans are failing to learn basic facts about our history and unique form of constitutional government.

More importantly, they are not learning the most essential thing about America—the principles of self-government on which America was founded.

As a result, many of our nation's young people do not have the respect for and devotion to America necessary to perpetuate American freedom.

OUR MISSION

The mission of the Ashbrook Center is to strengthen constitutional self-government by educating our fellow Americans—students, teachers, and citizens—in the history and Founding principles of our country and the habits of reflection and choice necessary to perpetuate our republic.



THE ASHBROOK NETWORK

The principles of freedom are not bound to any particular time or place. That is why we work wherever American citizens do the day-to-day work of self-government.

You can find Ashbrook students, teachers, and citizens in every state. Some join us on the campus of Ashland University in Ashland, Ohio for seminars, courses, and special events before returning home with changed hearts and minds. Others learn with us in their own backyards at schools, museums, and historical sites across the country. And of course, many connect and learn the true story of America from the comfort of their own homes.

Ashbrook's network of students, teachers, and citizens includes Americans of all backgrounds—proving, as the Founders wrote in 1776, we are "one people."

THE ASHBROOK WAY OF TEACHING AND LEARNING

At Ashbrook, we believe civic education is an education for self-government. It is not about information or indoctrination. It is about discovering the truth about America. We believe Aristotle's old maxim that "all men by nature desire to know," but we add, "they don't want to be told." They want to discover the truth for themselves.



Restoring Proper Pride in America.

The Hilda E. Bretzlaff Ashbrook Academy is a summer program designed for rising high school students who share a deep interest in U.S. history, politics, and economics. Unlike other programs that tend to erode confidence and pride in our country by emphasizing its historical failures, the Academy invites students to consider the American experiment in self-government as a triumph, a victory for the principles of freedom that warrants grateful celebration but also demands serious study.

The Academy began with a single course in 2015 and grew to five courses this summer:

Student Highlight: Senou K.

Senou K. from Phoenix, Arizona, wasn't sure what to expect when he arrived in rural Ohio for the "Supreme Court and the Constitution" session of the Academy.

Senou was pleasantly surprised to find himself quickly drawn into lively debate about Court opinions. The only classes Senou had known before his Ashbrook experience were lecture-style and heavily textbook-based. "Being able to interact with professors directly and have a conversation was a big change for me." he said.

After getting a taste of what study rooted in primary documents and conversation was like. Senou didn't want to go home. "I need this!" he said. "The discussion, the critical thinking, the philosophy... considering questions that we don't always know the answers to. The Academy makes you a better person."

TEACHING AMERICAN HISTORY PROGRAMS

Reaching the Young Through Those Who Teach the Young.

Teaching American History programs help teachers deepen their understanding of American history and civics and engage their students in thoughtful conversations about the enduring questions of American history. Students not only learn the subject but also begin making their own judgements about the testimony of the past. In so doing, they learn to think for themselves and develop the habits necessary for self-government.

One teacher can reach up to 5,000 students over the course of their career. Teaching American History programs have a multiplier effect reaching students in classrooms across the country.





Teacher Spotlight: Brian M.

Brian M., a history and government teacher in Michigan, proudly calls himself a "history nerd." Part of his mission in teaching, as he sees it, is to inspire similar passion in his students.

It's often an uphill battle, with "few students entering the classroom caring deeply about U.S. history and government," according to Brian. More often, students deride social studies in favor of STEM subjects. Brian sees a crisis in this. "If we don't have a knowledgeable electorate, nothing else really matters."

Brian is currently earning his Master's degree from Ashbrook, which has helped him do his part in solving the crisis. He's learned to approach students with the respect due to American citizens, which they enthusiastically respond to. In class, he models healthy, good-natured disagreement. As his students begin to open up about their own views, he challenges them. "No matter what side of an argument you guys take, I will take the opposite side, even if it's not my real opinion. Get ready to defend yourselves, to push back against me."

How will Americans recover the common ground they need to share in self-government? They need the experience of honest and fruitful debate. "It has to come through education," Milliron says.

"Wading into the Complexities of Human Experience"

Teaching American history, especially teaching sensitive topics like slavery, is a difficult task in today's world. While some people may ignore slavery or minimize its terrible consequences, many others say that our nation was founded on slavery. Most of the ready-made resources teachers use—textbooks and popular lesson plans—present one simplified view or the other.

There is a better way. Using historical documents, teachers can help students see the complex truth that America was founded on principles of equality and freedom and that the history of America is the story of our struggle to live up to those principles. Vince B., a teacher in Indiana, learned this approach studying with Ashbrook and now uses it with his students.

"I try to get them to wade into the complexities of the human experience," he says. At first glance, students—like textbooks—cannot take figures like Thomas Jefferson seriously. Vince invites students to put aside their preconceived notions and read Jefferson's writings. When they do, students discover that even though Jefferson was a slaveholder, he was tormented by his part in slavery, and even went so far as to denounce the institution in his first draft of the Declaration of Independence. As students wrestle with Jefferson's writings, they start to see that "I'm a flawed individual, just like the person I'm reading about." Knowing this, most students will realize they can admire Jefferson's accomplishments and abhor slavery at the same time.

"The great value of exposing the whole story, warts and all, is that it gives us a credible account, one we can see ourselves in," Vince said. "That's how we come to see our own shortcomings and think about how to correct them."



CITIZEN PROGRAMS

Events that Educate and Inspire.

Being an American citizen requires vigilance, attention to the issues of the day, and ongoing education in the principles of our nation. For over 35 years, Ashbrook's citizen programs have been an important resource for Americans striving to be better informed. During the past academic year, Ashbrook focused on making these programs accessible to all citizens, wherever they reside.

Through webinars, the Major Issues Lecture Series, and a new podcast called The American Idea, we are pleased to report that citizens from all 50 states participated.

As of October 2021, over 25,000 individuals had downloaded the podcast and over 1,300 subscribed. Two especially popular episodes were a special conversation with Fox News Contributor Mollie Hemingway and a conversation on Frederick Douglass with Professor Lucas Morel.

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
